REPUBLIC DECLARED AT BUDAPEST. REVOLUTION BEGUN IN VIENNA.

OFFICERS AND SOLDIERS LEAD THE REVOLT.

BERNE, Thursday.

The *Berliner Tageblatt* states that a revolution, organised by the soldiers and officers, has broken out in Vienna and Budapest. At the latter place the prisons were stormed and the revolutionary troops proclaimed a Republic.

The same journal prints the following telegram from Vienna:—

"A Republic is coming, and events are following thick and fast. Last evening a procession of several thousand soldiers and officers assembled outside the Austrian Parliament House, while other thousands of soldiers and crowds of workmen besieged the War Office."

The *Vossische Zeitung* publishes the following telegram from Budapest:—

Last evening a crowd several thousand strong collected in the Gizellaplatz in front of the Hungarian National Council building. Four regiments, led by their officers, arrived in close column and took the oath of fidelity to the National Council. They afterwards marched through the streets amid indescribable enthusiasm.

Two young officers belonging to the military council formed yesterday were arrested. One was immediately rescued by the crowd, but the second was taken to the

Kommandatur. The crowd made a rush at the building. The guard was immediately ordered to take up arms, and the onslaught was checked, but the soldiers soon left their posts, threw down their rifles and joined the crowd. An immense throng then made its way to the military prison, which was taken by storm, and all the civilian and military prisoners were set free.

Soldiers, led by officers with drawn swords, marched through the streets amid enthusiastic cheering, shouting, "Long live the Republic!"

All the soldiers had removed the Imperial cockade from their helmets and replaced it by the Hungarian colours.

The revolutionary troops took possession of the Eastern railway terminus and stopped two trains which were on the point of leaving for the front. The soldiers in the trains swarmed out and joined the revolutionaries, who have machine-guns and large quantities of arms and munitions taken from the Hungarian factories.

It was announced last night that the 32nd Budapest regiment had mutinied and gone over to the Republic in a body. The military commandant at Budapest is reported to be a prisoner in the hands of the Hungarian troops.—Radio.
